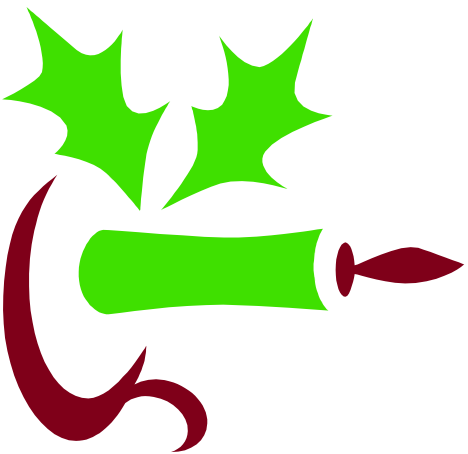

Forward two, three, four - back two, three, four. James & Kirsty have been teaching 70 chinese students celtich dancing in Yangling, about an hour west of Xian! Sometimes we wonder whether they are learning Mandarin or teaching the Scottish language & culture to the Chinese. Perhaps, it is a bit of both.



Anyway they were in Yangling because they are planning to take a team of 10 to 12 people there, next summer, for 4 weeks from 8th July to 8th August 2008. This will involve teaching English to Chinese students in the morning and doing Olympic themed activities with them in the afternoon. There will also be the chance to see the sights and relax towards the end of the trip. This will appeal to students in their summer holidays, although anyone over 18 is welcome, but the more Scots the merrier. Any hammer throwers out there? The trip finishes before the Olympics start. James & Kirsty appreciated a 'flying visit' from Catherine Stihler and her husband at the end of October.

James informs us that Xian is now really cold. Chinese heating systems are run by calendar dates and will not be turned on until Nov. 15th, no matter how cold it is. They are both looking for stamina, motivation and continued progress in their language study. The more their Chinese progresses, the tougher

it gets, resulting in more time and effort. At the time of writing their first language assessments are due. This will let them know what progress they have made to date and what they have to work on. Although it is not an exam as such it is equally nerve wracking.

We have just posted their Christmas parcels - some by airmail, others by surface mail so at least something should arrive by the 25th December. James & Kirsty ask us to extend Christmas greetings to you all in Scotland.

Please keep them in your thoughts as this will be the first time either has been unable to visit their parents over the Christmas period.

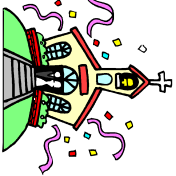

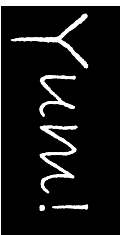

## Real Irish Christmas Pud

Servings: 8 – 10 per pudding. Recipe makes 2 x 2 pint puddings

Level of difficulty: Easy

Cooking Time: 4 – 5 hours, plus 1 hour on Christmas Day  
Best made several months in advance to allow the flavours to develop.

### Ingredients for the puddings:

- |  |                         |
|--|-------------------------|
| * 8oz self raising flour                             | * zest of 1 orange      |
| * 8oz white breadcrumbs                              | * 2 lbs mixed fruit, eg |
| * pinch salt   | * 12oz sultanas         |
| * 3 tsp mixed spice                                  | * 10oz currants         |
| * 1½ tsp nutmeg                                      | * 10oz raisins          |
| * 9oz soft brown sugar                               | * 3oz mixed peel        |
| * 9oz suet   | * ½pint Guinness        |
| * 1 medium desert apple (eg COX),<br>peeled & grated | * 1 egg                 |

1. The night before you want to make the puddings put all the fruit, including the orange zest and mixed peel, into a large mixing bowl. Pour over the ale and mix. Cover with cling film and leave to soak overnight.
2. Next day, ¼ fill two large pots with water and put on to boil. Place a saucer into each pot.
3. Grease the inside of the two pudding basins with butter.
4. Meanwhile, mix all the remaining ingredients with the soaked fruit. Split the mixture between the two pudding basins. Cover and simmer for 4 to 5 hours.
5. Remove the lids from the basins and allow the puddings to cool down. When cold, replace the lids and store in a cool dark place until Christmas.
6. On Christmas Day, simply heat the pudding up by simmering it for an hour or so before turning it out on to a warm plate, drenching it with brandy and setting it alight prior to serving it with fresh cream, brandy flavoured cream or custard.
